A guick handout narrative...

I started discussion with the "Epistemology of Plagiarism" handout [EofP Handout.pdf], to present the central point about plagiarism carrying evidence about the plagiarist's knowledge.

We then used the "An Experiment in Plagiarism" handout [EofP exercise.pdf] to 'test' the claim that answers carry evidence about expertise, independent of plagiary – even when they are 'simple' questions. (Didn't actually get to do the exercise, though... too much discussion! Should've asked for a 90-minute session.)

Provided an expert's original and plagiarized answers to the database question in "A database geek's answers" [EofP answers.pdf] to show that while plagiarism would not be obvious to nonexperts, it would to experts, while still being superior to philosophers' (nonexperts') answers, whether plagiarized or not.
